Dear FPC,
One of my favorite parts of being a pastor are the conversations I get to have with folks about their spiritual transformation. People often ask me how they might follow Jesus more closely or engage in practices that will help them grow their faith. They've been captured by God's love and they want to know what they should do next. All of us tend to want a list of rules to live by, or a set of goals to achieve. We want to do something! But the spiritual life is more about being than it is about doing. Even more, all our doing is supposed to flow from our being. If we don't keep this truth in view, it's only a matter of time before our faith feels a whole lot more like striving and hustling; we might even start thinking that we're earning God's love. This is why Paul writes to the church in Ephesus: "For it is by grace, you have been saved through faith. It is not your own doing. It is a gift from God. Not of works, lest anyone should boast." (Eph 2:8-10)

And yet, at the very same time, I always want to remind folks that once you get the order of operations right-doing flows from beingthere is indeed plenty to do. Paul also encourages the believers to work out their salvation, to run the race of faith, to fight the good fight, to pick up our cross and follow Jesus. Spiritual maturity is learning to live in the tension of this paradox: You're doing the best you can AND you can do better. Or to put it another way: God loves you exactly as you are right now AND God loves you enough to not let you stay that way.

Author Anne Lamott puts it this way... "I do not at all understand the mystery of grace-only that it meets us where we are but does not leave us where it found us." Grace won't leave you where it found you. Grace makes us WANT to change.

But how do we live our lives by grace without turning it into a hustle? How do we follow the ways of Jesus without being sucked into thinking we're achieving or earning God's love? Dr. Dallas Willard is helpful here. He writes; "Grace is, of course, unmerited favor. But grace is not opposed to effort. It IS opposed to earning. Earning is an attitude. Effort is an action. Grace, you know, does not just have to do with forgiveness of sins alone. We all know that Jesus said, (in John 15) 'without me you can do nothing'. But it is also true that if we do nothing, it will be without him."

We are called to live in and follow Christ. Spiritual growth will require your effort. Learning how to integrate God's gift of grace into our lives requires our participation. If grace is a gift, then it's our job to open that gift and hold onto it. But don't forget, grace is opposed to earning. We will never be our own messiah. Friends, grace claims that life is not a challenge to be achieved, but it is a gift to be received, it is a life to be given. And every day you have to allow yourself to confront this great choice that grace presents to you. Will you try to achieve your life, or will you receive your life today?

May you know the grace of the Lord Jesus Christ.

## The Book of the Prophet, Jonah

We all know about Jonah. Even folks who've never read the Bible, know enough about Jonah to talk about him being swallowed by a "whale." But there is A LOT more to this reluctant prophet's story. He ran from God. He resented his enemies. He lied. He had a terrible attitude. But then he eventually, finally, mostly surrendered to God's will. But it took being swallowed. Jonah is the anti-hero and thank God for his story, because often we are too. But this story isn't all about Jonah... it's also about God. The God who simply doesn't give up on us, no matter what.

Anybody want to see more love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control in your life? In the book of Galatians, Paul uses a gardening metaphor to help explain how God plants the 'Fruit of the God's Spirit' in our lives to help us learn to love and serve the Lord more faithfully. We're going to do a deep-dive into this spiritual fruit, seeing what we might learn about tending the soil of our souls. What might God grow in your life this summer?

## An Introduction to the Enneagram (Part 1)

TAUGHT BY DAVE WHITE, LICENSED MENTAL HEALTH THERAPIST | APRIL 14, 21, 28, MAY 12

In a world full of personality assessments, the Enneagram stands apart for the meaningful way it describes our behavior (and the basis of that behavior) and offers spiritual practices that help us live more faithfully. Pastor, Tim Keller, said, "We cannot know God without knowing ourselves, and we cannot know ourselves without knowing God. The two kinds of knowledge are interdependent-they rise or fall together." We will spend four weeks in April and May coming to know ourselves and our God even more. Dave will unpack the background of this ancient personality inventory, providing a narrative orientation to the nine Enneagram types, and help you begin to understand the Enneagram as a tool for spiritual growth. The structure of this class lends itself to being present for all 4 sessions. Meaning, if you pop in and out, you'll miss something important.

## PER CAPITA....WHAT IS IT?

Per Capita is the amount that every Presbyterian (U.S.A.) church pays for each member listed on its active membership roll.
Per Capita helps fund administrative costs for the denomination. Of the $\$ 42.35$ per capita for each active member on our rolls, the Presbytery of Utah receives $\$ 29.55$, Synod of the Rocky Mountains receives $\$ 3.00$ and General Assembly receives $\$ 9.80$. The 2024 per capita will fund the everyday work of the Presbytery, support churches in the state of Utah, provide support to pastors, and assist in other needs of the congregations.

## EXTRAORDINARY CHURCH EXPENSES

One of our resident squirrels sat on our power line causing the church to lose power and the squirrel to lose his life. Besides the inconvenience to the staff, this caused damage to our HVAC system and our alarm system, necessitating the replacement of several parts. We also had a leak in our Fellowship Hall dishwasher that collapsed a large section of the ceiling in our Basement Fellowship Hall.


## Pamelas Closet

The PC team was busy with the enjoyable responsibility of collecting and distributing donations during the Christmas Season. The Congregation was incredibly generous! We were able to donate adult clothing to unsheltered people who participated in the annual census. They were all very thankful to receive nice, warm, clothing. We packed up 70 big white garbage-can sized bags of brand-new clothing for children! These were taken to the Catholic Community Services to be distributed to the organizations who need clothing to meet the needs of folks in the community.
Now that spring has sprung, we are busy planning our Summer Shower for infants through teens. Starting at the beginning of April you will see reminders about what to donate for the children in our community. We are calling it a Summer Shower to emphasize the need for warm/hot weather items of clothing. This year we will also provide everyone with a link to buy needed items on Amazon and have them sent directly to the church. On April 28 ${ }^{\text {th }}$ the Pamela's Closet team will host the coffee hour and collect your gifts for the children in our community who need our help.
Remember that all year long we collect travel sized shampoo, soap, and conditioner to be donated to The Road Home and given to unsheltered folks who come in for a hot meal and a shower. Please continue to drop those items off in the Pamela's Closet collection container by the doors to the office.

Greetings! Troop 34 had a very busy winter! The Scouts did a lot of snow camping this winter and are becoming quite experienced at tent camping in cold temperatures. In January, the Troop camped at Rockport Reservoir where we fine-tuned our skills in winter activities including snowshoeing, winter outdoor cooking by stoves and Dutch ovens and preparing camp in roughly 2 feet of snow. In February, the Troop participated in the annual "Klondike Derby" at Camp Tracy (located in Mill Creek Canyon) and camped two cold nights while testing their Scout skills racing on the Yukon trail and competing in several different outdoor skills. In February, on "Scout Sunday," the Scouts were excited to assist with the worship service and served pancakes to members of the congregation. Also in February, the Troop participated in the annual Utah-wide "Scouting for Food" food drive, collecting food at our neighborhood Smith's. In March, the Troop camped at a Yurt (YMCA Camp Roger) in Soapstone Basin in the Uintas. This was a great location for snowshoeing and nordic skiing.

Congratulations to Frederick "Fritz" Neugebauer, Troop 34's newest Eagle Scout! Fritz worked with the Utah County Animal Shelter to improve the quality of life of dogs in the shelter. Eagle Scout is Scouting's highest award, earned by $<4 \%$ of all Scouts. Troop 34 has several more of our scouts currently planning their Eagle Scout projects to be executed this Spring and early Summer. Let us know if you are able to help!

Troop 34 recently welcomed several Webelos Scouts from Pack 3034 who "crossed over" into Troop 34, and we look forward to Spring in Utah. The youth leaders on the Patrol Leader's Council have planned a fun Spring program focusing on Scout skills, advancement, and outdoor learning. The program will include Nature and the Environment, Orienteering, and Sports.

The Troop is also preparing for a busy summer. In July, 14+Scouts will be attending summer camp at Camp Hunt at Bear Lake, Utah where we will be honing our waterfront skills and accomplishing a wide range of merit badge activities. In August, the Troop and Pack will visit Yellowstone National Park. In August, the Troop will go on our annual High Adventure Trip backpacking for 5-days (maybe 50 miles!??) in the beautiful Wind Rivers in Wyoming.

The Cub Scouts of Pack 3034 have been quite active during the last several months. Many of you probably saw us at the Kirkin' o' th' Tartan in October. Our Cub Scouts were honored to be in the opening procession. The Cub Scouts who attended each received a special Scouts Scotland Pin to commemorate their experience (Scouts is an International Movement). Many of you also recently supported the Pack by purchasing wreaths and other holiday items. We had a very successful sale this year and greatly appreciate all of your support.

Before the snow arrived, the Tiger Den (the first graders) had a visit at Red Butte Garden and planted a tree for future visitors to enjoy.

In September, the Lioness and Lion Den (kindergartners), the Bear Den (third graders), and the Webelos Den (fourth graders) had hikes in the local area. Our Webelos Arrow of Light Den (fifth graders) attended a Salt Lake City Council Meeting and conducted the opening flag ceremony.
In October Henry Dienes earned his Arrow of Light and crossed over to Troop 34. The other two Webelos Arrow of Light Scouts (5 $5^{\text {th }}$ graders), Gus Funaro and Briggs Trishman, earned their Arrow of Light awards and crossed over to Scout Troop 34 in February.

Over the past year we have had 18 new Cub Scouts join our Pack. Of these 18, 10 are girls! January and February were busy as well.
