DEAR FIRST PRESBYTERIAN MEMBERS & FRIENDS,

Why not find ways to enjoy spending some time with neighbors during these winter months and build relationships where you can approach spiritual conversations.

Pray for Neighbors

You and I have friends, family, and yes, neighbors, who may not yet place their hope in Jesus Christ. Write down their names. Start to pray for them. Someone has said, "We need to talk to God about people, then talk to people about God." Try to identify the names of each neighbor in your building, on your street or cul-de-sac. Make a list that will help you pray for each family as you build a relationship with them.

Invite People for Dessert

One of the best ways to get to know your neighbors is to have them over for dinner. It really isn't much work and is many times less threatening from their perspective. Dessert is less formal and requires a much smaller time commitment.

Ask for Advice

Everyone has differing talents and areas of expertise. One way of getting to know our neighbors better is to ask them for advice or help for yourself.

Join a Community Cause

Find out if your neighborhood has a Home Owners Association. If so, join in on neighborhood workdays, or find an association committee on which you can be a part. Find out if there is a neighborhood directory. If not, offer to put one together for those who would like one.

Have an Open House

Host a "dessert party." Hand deliver special invitations to homes in your area. Simply invited people to a "come and go" dessert party with several kinds of desserts for people to sample. Take advantage of special times in the year to invite the neighborhood over for food and fun.

Watch for Special Needs

Be on the lookout for special needs. Offer to baby sit or perhaps pet sit. Help to maintain yard work while neighbors are on vacation.

Start a Home Bible Study/Discussion Group

The most significant and rewarding step to getting to know your neighbors is to discuss spiritual issues with them. After spending the time to build relationships with those around you, invite your neighborhood to a new "Friendship Group" in your home one night each or every other week to see how the Bible can enrich your friendship.

"For we are therefore Christ's ambassadors, as though God were making his appeal through us" (II Corinthians 5:20). Be an active ambassador for Christ.

FROM THE PASTORAL ASSOCIATE

As we look at the sermon schedule that Pastor Mike has laid before us, you will notice that in February we will look at the book of Revelation. That probably elicits a variety of reactions from the congregation. Some of you may be excited, and you should be. It is an exciting book. But some of you may approach the book of Revelation with fear. There are some scary things in the book that are hard to understand. Others of you may approach it with indifference because it has been 2000 years since the first coming of Christ, so the book may not seem relevant anymore.

My desire is that when you come to church on February 3rd that you not approach Revelation either with fear or indifference. The book of Revelation is an important book with things relevant to our present and future, but perhaps not in the way you think. We need the book of Revelation. Without Revelation we are left with the later letters which are letters of encouragement for the early church to stay the course of following God and not getting caught up in the sins all around them. And we would then end at Jude where he asks the church to persevere. That may be encouraging, but it is certainly not a victorious ending by God. It just leaves us waiting.

So God's revelation to John is essential to know what the

promises still are. We are not just waiting. Revelation helps us know what we are waiting for. If you accept my premise that Revelation is an important book, that it is relevant, and that we should dig into it to better understand what God is still doing and going to do, then please take a few pieces of recommendation as we approach Revelation together.

Number one recommendation: put the newspaper down. For centuries people have tried to reconcile the book of Revelation with current events. And the only thing any of these approaches have had in common is that they have ALL BEEN WRONG. I will give you an example: in Revelation 16:12 the 6th angel pours its judgement on the Euphrates river and waits for an invasion by three kings from the East. Prior to WWI all of Europe was convinced that this represented the Ottoman Empire. Well, the Ottoman Empire did make inroads to Europe in the 15th and 16th Centuries, but came to an end in 1922. The end of the world did not come. So after WWI everyone shifted their gaze East to imperial Japan. They would be the invaders from the East. Well, after we signed a peace agreement with Japan after WWII and the end of the world did not come, then people shifted their gaze to China. And the list goes on. Do you see how unhelpful it is to do this with the

book of Revelation? It was not intended to be read this way.

So as we approach Revelation, Pastor Mike and I will help you understand what parts of it are historical, what parts are literal, what parts are symbolic, and what some of that symbolism means. Revelation is not all in the past or all in the future. We are in the midst of the book. And reading Revelation requires an understanding of the writings of Hebrew prophecy both in the Old Testament and other documents being written around the same time John wrote Revelation. We don't expect you to know all this, so we will help you move through it. But what is very important to know is that the message of Revelation is that there are promises yet to be kept by God. That the prayers of the saints do move through history, that God is just, that God cares about evil in the world, that God brings everyone to an equal playing field and addresses evil, and that we need to be right with God...it does matter. God's promises of Jesus' return and victory are ones of hope. To be a Christian living life with hope, we have to look at Revelation. I hope you will join us in February for this series!

We received 92% of the amount budgeted for Estimated Giving and spent 96% of budgeted expenses.

For 2018, we were able to meet all our mission and ministry costs. However, we used all our \$20,000.03 Contingency Fund, and C Street transferred an additional \$10,000 beyond their normal amount. That still left us with a shortfall of \$7,638.67. We received about 20% of our income in December.

We appreciate the many large and small gifts and the efforts the congregation made in giving extra gifts at the end of the year. GIFTS OF ALL AMOUNTS ADD UP to make the operation of the church ministry successful.


