PASTOR'S COLUMN

“It is more important to be seen as more Christlike than to be seen as right.” I heard that and it stopped me in my tracks. We are called to be like Jesus, not to convince everyone that we are right about everything. I think this is absolutely right! If we incorporated this into our daily life, what would change? If our first goal in our interactions with others was being as much like Jesus as we can be (kind, loving, fair, not insisting on our own way, putting others’ interests first) –how would that impact our conversations? Our relationships with our neighbors? Our social media behavior?

The context of this was a professor who had written about women’s ordination—a topic like so many these days that cause people on all sides of the issue to “take out their knives” as they start to engage. But she took a different tack. She would post links to her critics’ papers interacting with her. She was determined that truth could win and she did not have to defend herself. But the impact of her actions was to live a little bit more like Jesus. And it disarmed people. It changed the tone of the conversation. Jesus calls us to be salt and light in our culture. Maybe the place to start is by focusing more on acting like Jesus rather than on winning debates!

Our best witness to Christ is to do things that make people ask why did we it when the only answer is Jesus. We want to get people to ask questions that lead them to Jesus! The famous philosopher Dallas Willard taught at USC. One year he had an especially arrogant and outspoken student who really attacked Willard and his positions in class. Others in the class were excitedly waiting for Willard to put this brat in his place. Instead Dallas said, “Why don’t we stop there for today.” After class people asked him why he didn’t correct the student’s many mistakes. Willard said, “I’m practicing the discipline of not having the last word.” Wow!

As we approach the season of Lent, this is an especially good time to take some steps toward Jesus. The very best thing we can do is spend time with Jesus! Here are two wonderful resources that help you pray, listen to scripture and be quiet with Jesus—all in about 10 minutes a day! But whatever you do—let’s all try to keep Jesus first. If we all care more about behaving like Jesus than we care about “winning” we will be well on our way to the only winning that matters! John 12:43 warns of those religious folks who “when push came to shove cared more for human approval than for God’s glory.” (the Message). May we always keep Jesus first!

FROM THE PASTORAL ASSOCIATE

Last year we lost our dear Llyod Ferguson. He did countless things at FPC and had a heart for his church like no one I have ever known as well as was an amazing human being and I miss him very much. I remember hoping that when scout Sunday came around this year (in a few weeks) we could have a celebration of his life at First Pres with scouts and members and community. But it looks like that can't happen yet. We are not at the point to having a large group of people safely with the scouts carrying the color guard down the center aisle. It feels the same way when it comes to celebrating the lives of Tom Riley, Jo Ostling, D'Anne Chapman, and indeed my own father. What to do with this delayed grief? The ritual of funeral gatherings are so important to our grieving processes. How do we navigate this delay for so long?

Well for one, we cannot delay our feelings. We can't say "I'll feel sad later." We feel sad now and have to recognize that and validate it. It is unhealthy to put it off, especially during a pandemic. It will just further bottleneck the emotions we are facing today. We need to grieve now, even if differently. One thing that helps is reaching out to others who knew these loved ones and sharing about them. This can be done by card or over the phone or exchanging pictures. And be careful to collect those stories and pictures. We can share them when we can eventually be together.

These stories and pictures can also be put together in a virtual memory book to be enjoyed by many. And a tip: enjoy the virtual memory book with someone else, not just alone. The social aspect is also helpful.

You can always write to your lost loved one. The act of writing by hand (not typing) is processed in the brain differently. There is a more real sense that you did it and processed it. And there is nothing creepy about writing to someone you have lost. It is like journaling and gives you a platform to express what you need to say.

You can also "do" things in honor of someone. You can plant a tree, a plant, go to one of their favorite places with their picture, dedicate something in their name at an organization they cherished. If they were a bog sports fan you can set up a zoom to watch the game together in their honor and share stories during the breaks. If they loved to bake, have a baking party, whether with your immediate household or over zoom.

What I am trying to convey is that you should not leave the grief of this last year on "hold." Go ahead and address it. Be creative. And when we can, we will share those comforting hugs together.

In 2020 we received a PPP loan from the government as part of the COVID relief effort in the spring totaling \$135,085. We expect that it will be converted into a grant in the coming months and not require any repayment. We spent the PPP loan on payroll for the church and C Street. That freed up other money in our budget. Not counting the PPP loan as income, we ended up 2020 with an operating budget deficit of \$15,745.13. Taking the PPP loan into account, we ended the year with a surplus of \$73,339.87. In order to keep the church functioning, we spent almost \$20,000 on livestreaming.

We appreciate the many large and small gifts and the efforts the congregation made to keep the church functioning. GIFTS OF ALL AMOUNTS ADD UP to make the operation of the church ministry successful.

ASH WEDNESDAY SERVICE

Join us for our Ash Wednesday service on **February 17 at 7 pm.**

This quiet service kicks off the season of Lent and is a time of getting honest with ourselves and God, and being assured once again of the free gift of God's saving grace for us. It is called Ash Wednesday because of the tradition of putting ashes in the form of a cross on our foreheads. Ashes are a symbol of repentance and remind us of our transitory nature ("Remember you are dust and to dust you shall return" Gen 3:19). The cross reminds us of the lengths God goes to rescue us, despite all of our failings.

Even though we are people of sin and dirt—we are made in God's image and saved to be part of God's family forever! That is amazing!



LENT 2021

Last year many people joked about how they had inadvertently given up everything for Lent. All of the pandemic lockdowns started right around the time Lent began and we suddenly were all living very different lives. This year, God willing, our lives will be getting more and more "normal" (even if not really that normal yet!) through Lent. But it still is a good time to make some changes to grow your faith.

What is Lent? It is a season of the church year leading up to Easter time. The word Lent comes from an old English word for springtime. It is a time for growing in our faith as we prepare for the amazing news of Easter. Traditionally it is a time of fasting and discipline and especially of reconciliation—of putting relationships right again.

When is Lent? It is a period of 40 days leading up to Easter. It begins on Ash Wednesday (February 17 this year) and ends on Holy Saturday (the day before Easter, which is April 3 this year). If you are the kind of person who tests what they are told, you've noticed that that is a period of 46 days! That is because you counted the 6 Sundays of Lent, which are not part of Lent! I know, it's confusing! But the reason is cool-- Lent is a time of self-discipline (fasting) as we listen to God. Sundays (ALL Sundays) are festivals that remind us of Easter—God's rescue of us through Jesus. We worship God on Sunday because that is the day of Easter, the day Jesus rose from the dead and launched God's new creation project. So even during fasting times like Lent we stop to celebrate the good news of Easter every Sunday!

What should I do about Lent? There are no requirements for Lent and no rules that must follow. We serve a gracious Lord. BUT—the point of Lent is to use this time to grow closer to Jesus, to grow in our faith. People have often found that denying themselves certain things during this time helps them focus on Jesus more clearly. That is called fasting. Maybe you could choose to not eat one meal a week and use that time for praying (and maybe give that money to a food bank). Some people choose to change their TV watching and use that time in prayer and Bible reading. Some folks step away from Facebook, etc.

The point is not to impress others or to somehow impress God (good luck with that!). No—the point is to intentionally create space in your life to be with God. To slow down, quiet down, and listen to God. To just spend time with the One who loves you most of all, and invest in the most important relationship in your life.

Consider making a change in your schedule to create space for being with Jesus. Then fill that time with quiet, prayer, and scripture. Maybe set an alarm (or the One Minute Pause) on your phone remind you to stop and pray a time or two a day. Or commit to praying with a friend each day. You could follow one of the resources on our Growing with Jesus page. Whatever you do, give yourself grace for when you fail AND be persistent to keep trying to do it. Jesus loves being with you—that is why he came, why he went to the cross, and why he reaches out to you now—this Lent take some time each day and spend it with him!



IN PERSON WORSHIP SERVICE

Dear First Presbyterian Church and Friends;

As we have announced in worship, your Session has decided to resume in-person worship in limited numbers on February 14th at the 9 am service and February 21st at the 11 am service. After that we hope to have people in worship at both services, if all goes well.

This decision comes after months of consultations with experts (including two epidemiologists), our own research team, as well as hours of prayer and discussion. Not only have the health issues been considered, but also the nature of our congregation, the features of our building, and the overall circumstances of our congregation.

As we move towards welcoming people to in person worship, please understand that we believe that MANY people in our church family should NOT attend worship in person at this time. People who are at “high risk”—over age 65 or with underlying health conditions—should not attend. Similarly, people who live with people who are high risk should strongly consider not attending in person. Of course, everyone will continue to be able to join online as in the past months.



As you probably know, many churches are operating with limited in-person worship numbers successfully. Our session and its consultants have determined that we can reasonably do this for people at lower risk with the following measures in place for now. The purpose of these measures is to protect everyone as much as possible from infection, especially by asymptomatic carriers. We mask and stay distanced to protect *other* people in case we are sick and do not know it. If you are not able to abide by the following restrictions, please worship from home for now.

1. Live streaming of our worship will continue. For many of you that is the right answer for now and we hope you continue to worship that way.
2. **No one** at high risk or who is not feeling well should attend in person. Please do not come in person if you have a cough, fever, chills, shortness of breath, sore throat, loss of taste or smell, or muscle pain, or had any of them within the last few days.
3. The turnover of air in the sanctuary has been calculated and will refresh between the two services.
4. Entrance and exit points will be clearly marked. In general, we encourage people to enter from the front doors (on South Temple) and exit from the C St doors. (People unable to use the front stairs may of course use the C St entrance to avoid stairs).
5. Touch free hand sanitizer dispensers will be available at both the entrance and exits.
6. All attendees should sign up ahead of time to ensure safe numbers (this will be available over the phone or via the website). We will limit attendance at each service to (50?) worshippers.
7. All attendees will be sitting 10 feet apart in marked seating areas. Family units who live together may sit together, of course.
8. 9 am and 11 am attendees will be sitting in different sections of the sanctuary so surfaces like pews are not shared (this permits them to be safe without cleaning the whole sanctuary between services).
9. Masks will be required at all times when in the building.
10. Attendees will need to hum, not sing during worship for now.
11. No classes in smaller rooms or fellowship hour will be resumed at this time. We hope that children will worship with their families, either in the pews or at home.
12. No fellowship time will be held in person at this time. Sadly this means no coffee, no hugs, no handshakes for now.

We know worship will look and feel different. We will continue to adjust to “new normals” as they arrive. But the value of worship cannot be overstated. We intend to offer safe worship options both in person and online, which we pray help all of us draw closer to our Lord and Savior Jesus.

We have had a variety of reactions to this decision so far. Some members have indicated they think we should have offered this long before now. Others have indicated they think it is still too soon to do this. We recognize, respect and understand these varying feelings. Given that none of us have lived through a pandemic before, none of

us have all of the answers. This is why we have taken nine months to watch, learn and prepare. The health professionals know a lot more about this virus and how it is transmitted than they did last March. Based on this learning, the session feels that resuming in person worship with these restrictions is reasonable. However, it is NOT risk free for anyone. Anyone choosing to worship in person assumes those risks.

We will circulate a link to permit people to sign up for in person worship by email and on our website soon. If you do not get our church emails and would like to, please let the office know and we can add you. Alternatively, you can call the office with your name, number of people, and selected service (9 am or 11 am) at 801-363-3889. If you have questions, please contact Pastor Steve, Pastor Chris, or any of our session elders.

We are hopeful that as the year unfolds, we can move more and more back towards a typical Sunday morning experience, while continuing to offer high quality online worship experiences too. Please be in prayer for all of us as we navigate through this uncharted territory! We are confident that God will guide us and we pray that we all are listening well.

Thank you for your support, engagement and dedication to Jesus through this crazy time!
